The Story Behind the Hymn

Perhaps not all fans of the Vicar of Dibley will recognise this as a Psalm...

But, not all people that on earth do dwell have ever heard of Dawn French, although they might sing:

sing to the Lord with cheerful voice;
Him serve with mirth, His praise
forth-tell;
come ye before Him and rejoice! “

Which of course is based on Psalm 100.
