

## Oberammergau Passion Play 2010

In September last year two of our members, David and Sylvia Watt, made the journey to the village of Oberammergau in Bavaria Germany.

The background to the play is that in 1632 the town was suffering from the bubonic plaque. The residents vowed that if God spared them from the effects of the bubonic plague ravaging the region they would produce a play every 10 years thereafter depicting the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. The death rate slowly subsided to just one in July 1633. The townspeople believed they had been spared so they kept their vow and performed the first passion play in 1634.

Everyone taking part in the passion play has to have lived in the village for a minimum of 20 years. All the performers are laymen and pursue their normal careers which include a flight attendant, a psychologist, wood carvers, housewives and so forth. The performers are not allowed to wear wigs or false beards, so all the men have to let their hair and beards grow. For the year of the performances they largely put their lives on hold and live the Passion play.

Cont'd ...... By taking their roles in the passion play, the performers are fulfilling the promise made to God made by their ancestors, celebrating their faith and sharing it with the world.

The five hour performance of the life of Jesus begins with his triumphant entrance into Jerusalem through to his resurrection on Easter morning. Many of the gospel stories come alive, including Jesus clearing the temple of the traders and the last supper. Jesus' betrayal and arrest in Gethsemane were particularly moving.

So realistic is the performance that you sense the audience is feeling the crown of thorns as it is thrust on Jesus' head. The emotion felt as Judas hanged himself on the tree, the shouting of the crowd as Jesus stands silent in the judgement hall produced an air of amazement in the audience.


Of course, the crucifixion scene is the most emotional and thought provoking, when the beaten and bruised Jesus is hung on the cross between two criminals. It was evident from many in the audience who were in tears that their hearts were greatly touched by the fact that God loved us so much that he allowed Jesus to suffer this cruel death so that we can have the gift of eternal life

The final scene is the joy of the resurrection helping to renew our faith and confidence in the fact that Christ has conquered death once and for all.

This was David and Sylvia's second visit to Oberammergau. They found it an amazing experience which was very difficult to describe to anyone who has not been. It was both deeply moving and sincere. It was spectacular, professionally and sensitively performed; it drew the audience into each situation in a truly remarkable way unlike any other performance or play that they had ever seen. They feel blessed to have had the opportunity to be part of this amazing experience.

## Easter Eggs

The egg is seen by followers of Christianity as a symbol of resurrection: while being dormant it contains a new life sealed within it.

In the Orthodox and Eastern Catholic Churches, Easter eggs are dyed red to represent the blood of Christ, shed on the Cross, and the hard shell of the egg symbolized the sealed Tomb of Christ - the cracking of which symbolized his resurrection from the dead. Easter eggs are blessed by the priest at the end of the Paschal Vigil, and distributed to the faithful. Each household also brings an Easter basket to church, filled not only with Easter eggs but also with other Paschal foods such as paska, kulich or Easter breads, and these are blessed by the priest as well.

Egg hunt is a game during which decorated eggs, real hard-boiled ones or artificial ones filled with, or made of chocolate of various sizes, are hidden for children to find, both indoors and outdoors. When the hunt is over, prizes may be given for the largest number of eggs collected, or for the largest or the smallest egg.

In the North of England, at Easter-time, a traditional game is played where hard boiled *pace eggs* are distributed and each player hits the other player's egg with their own. This is known as "egg tapping" or "egg dumping". The winner is the holder of the last intact egg. The losers get to eat their eggs.

Egg rolling is also a traditional Easter egg game played with eggs at Easter. In England, Germany, and other countries children traditionally rolled eggs down hillsides at Easter. This tradition was taken to the New World by European settlers, and continues to this day each Easter on the White House lawn.
