Never give up - Creaton URC has, for the past years, sponsored Simona, one of the girls at BibleLands Cedar Home in Beirut. It is good to receive letters from her from time to time and to know that in some small way our sponsorship has made a difference to Simona's life in a country that has suffered so much strife over the years. Below is an abbreviated article from the BibleLands Magazine:

"The 21 girls living at the Cedar Home in Beirut come from a variety of backgrounds, but life has not been easy for them. The home which BibleLands has supported since 1980, provides a safe, caring environment for girls who have suffered neglect or abuse, or whose parents can no longer look after them. It is like a big family, to which the girls return after each day at the local school, and which supports them as they grow up and move onto university and work.

The newest member of the Cedar Home family is 16 year old Lina. She went to live there in November 2009, having escaped a harsh and traumatic family situation. A couple of weeks after arriving at the home she wrote a very touching poem which she felt portrayed her life. She signed it "By Nobody". When Lina showed the poem to the Home's Director, Chadi Melki, she asked him what he thought? Chadi writes he did not know what to say. Lina said "No need to say anything" she said "I already received an answer". Lina asked me to turn over the page and read on. I did, she had written the following on the back of the same piece of paper.

God talking; Lina, you're my daughter. You told me you wanted to be remade, you told me that I'm the only one who cares about you.

You prayed every day but you thought no one hears you. But you're wrong -I do hear you every day, and I do care what you pray, but I ask you to be straight with me, to listen to my voice in your heart. Try, don't give up -I' always be by your side. I will always hold you in my arms. I will not disappoint you, because you're my dear daughter, you're special and you are strong enough to pass by every pain and every problem - you'll do that.

Don't give up, keep on praying, and don't forget to listen to the voice in your heart that will lead to heaven's way."

Gift Aid Scheme

This is a reminder that your offerings to your Church can be Gift Aided. This means that the Church can claim tax from the Inland Revenue on your offering. Basic rate tax is 20%, which means that if you give £10 using Gift Aid, it's worth £12.50 to the Church. For donations between 6 April 2008 and 5 April 2011 the Church or charity will also get a separate government supplement of 3p on every pound you give.

The easiest way to do this is by the Churches' Weekly Offering envelopes provided by the Church. If you are a tax payer, then the Church can reclaim the tax back from the Inland Revenue.

There is no further cost to you or indeed any forms to complete and your Church will benefit. You will also have the satisfaction of knowing that your offerings will be increased. Please speak to your Church Treasurer who will be delighted to answer any queries you might have.



Lent 2011

Why is it called Lent?

Lent is an old English word meaning 'lengthen'. Lent is observed in spring, when the days begin to get longer. Lent is the period of six weeks 40 days (not including Sundays) leading up to Easter, the most important festival in the Christian calendar. Lent starts on Ash Wednesday (9th March) in western Christian Churches. and climaxes during Easter Week. The last week of Lent is called Holy Week.

During the 40 days of Lent, Christians remember the time when Jesus went into the desert to fast and pray before beginning his work for God. During this time Jesus was tempted several times by Satan, but was able to resist.

Fasting

Lent is a time of giving things up. For Christians, it is one way of remembering the time Jesus' fasted in the desert and is a test of self-discipline. There are many foods that some Christians do not eat in Lent, such as meat and fish, fats, eggs, and milky foods. Some Christians just give up something they really enjoy such as cakes, chocolate or alcohol.

Shrove Tuesday

In western Christian churches, the day before Lent starts is Shrove Tuesday. This is also known as Pancake Day. This day was traditionally the last chance to use up the foods Christians would not be eating during Lent.

Festivities take place in many cities all over the world, including Mardi Gras in New Orleans (USA), Carnivals in Rio de Janeiro (Brazil) and Venice (Italy). People dress up, wear masks, parade and dance in the streets.

Ash Wednesday

On Ash Wednesday many western Christian churches hold services during which Christians are marked on the forehead with a cross of ashes. This is a sign of saying sorry to God for any wrong doing (penitence) and mortality. The ashes come from burning the palm crosses from Palm Sunday of the previous year.

Street Pastors Cut Crime

The contribution of Street Pastors in Kingston-upon-Thames has been acknowledged, with violent crime dropping by almost half in the nightspots. Kingston, one of London's most popular night-clubbing destinations, hosts over 20,000 people every weekend, yet in the 5 years that Street Pastors have been working in the town, violence has nearly halved and crime as a whole has fallen by 25%.

Over 5,000 Street Pastors now patrol town centres across the UK, including Daventry.

Shrove Tuesday (this year on 8th March) was once known as a 'half-holiday' in England. It started at 11:00 am with the signalling of a church bell. On Shrove Tuesday (commonly known as Pancake Day in the UK) pancake races are held in villages and towns. The tradition is said to have originated when a housewife from Olney was so busy making pancakes that she forgot the time until she heard the church bells ringing for the service. She raced out of the house to church while still carrying her frying pan and pancake. Pancake races still remains a festive tradition in the UK, whereby participants run through the streets whilst tossing pancakes into the air, catching them in the pan.

Gambia Project

The four Pastorate churches have agreed to provide funding to re-roof part of the Upper Basic School in Gunjur village in The Gambia. The school provides education for 1,700 children, aged between 8 and 13. The roof to one block of the school was damaged during storms in 2009, destroying many desks and rendering the classrooms unusable. The re-roofing will cost £2,000. Each of the four churches is committed to the project and will be raising their portion of the funds in different ways. Please look out for fund raising events and do your best to support them.
