"Moderator" is clearly a word that is well-used within the United Reformed Church, since we have three different kinds of Moderator, all undertaking a different role.

Moderator of General Assembly

Previously General Assembly met every year and the "Moderator" served Assembly for a 12 month term. The role alternated between "clergy" and "lay". However, General Assembly now meets once every two years so it has two "Moderators", one clergy and one lay, who serve a two year term alongside each other. The United Reformed Church website defines their role as follows: "The moderators of General Assembly are the national figureheads for the denomination, representing the United Reformed Church both internally and within the wider world; they chair major meetings, visit churches at home and abroad, and seek to provide worship, teaching and pastoral care."

Synod Moderator

Defining the role of Synod Moderator is, I think, as impossible as defining the role of a Minister. Basically, it's different in every place. However, to quote one Moderator, it is about "providing support and pastoral care to all the churches and Ministers within the Synod". Previously names of potential (ordained) candidates for the role of Synod Moderator were nominated, but nowadays although this process still exists, those interested in the role can apply as one would for any job vacancy. Currently, Synod Moderators serve for a seven year term.

Interim Moderator

This is the person appointed to oversee and help a church or group of churches during a time of vacancy. If you want to know more about the role of the Interim Moderator then have a chat with Jenny Theairs at Creaton who has recent first hand experience.
