The Olympics - what you didn't know

This summer sees the UK hosting the 104^{th} Olympics. There will, of course, be plenty of media coverage of the events, but here are a few facts about the Olympics Games that may not be so well documented.

The original purposes of the Olympic Games are to foster the ideal of a "sound mind in a sound body" and to promote friendship among nations. The first ancient Olympic Games can be traced back to 776 BC. They were dedicated to the Olympian gods and were staged on the ancient plains of Olympia. They continued for nearly 12 centuries, until Emperor Theodosius decreed in 393 AD that all such "pagan cults" be banned.

The modern Olympic Games were revived in 1896 when the Games were held in Athens and 14 countries were represented by about 245 men, competing in 43 events.



The Winter Games were added in 1924. The two World Wars forced cancellation of the Olympics in 1916, 1940, and 1944, but they resumed in 1948 in London and these were the first Games to be shown on television. Germany and Japan weren't invited, but a record 59 other countries attended

In 1988 the Seoul games drew entries from a record total of 160 countries. While the number of athletes who competed in Los Angeles in 1984 did not surpass the high of 10,000 (set at Munich in 1972), the Los Angeles games set records for the largest total attendance - almost 5.8 million people - and the most gold medals for one country - 83 for the United States. The centennial Olympic Games in 1996 opened in Atlanta with more than 10,000 athletes from a record 197 nations in attendance.

When, in 2005, London won the bid to host the games, it became the first city to officially host the modern Olympic Games three times, having previously done so in 1908 and in 1948. The 2012 London games will take place between 27 July to 12 August and at present 181 countries have qualified to send at least 1 participant to the games. Let's see what records are broken over the summer.
