

A Message & News from The Minister

"Is Spring Nearly Here Yet?" We seem to have had a long winter and although the birds are beginning their Spring Choruses, heavy frosts, fog and mucky cars warn us not to discard the thermal underwear, just yet.

Over Christmas through January and February we have said goodbyes to and given thanks for some good friends. Please remember that after the memorials and the thanksgiving services, it can be quite challenging to be alone and still grieving. Pick up the phone for a chat with someone who is facing new circumstances- or invite them round for coffee.

If <u>Jimmy Saville</u> and <u>Rolf Harris</u> have let you down, by behaving in inappropriate ways, you should read on...I am aware that some of you have been concerned about the URC safeguarding policy - that we do all we can to safeguard vulnerable adults and children. We are halfway through the URC Past Case Review, which continues to be willing to accept reports from individuals and churches. The Past Case Review Team have sent an article to all churches and it is good to understand what is happening as part of the government lead review. Please do take time to read it.

I am planning to offer this year's (Churches Together in Britain

& Ireland) <u>Lent study course</u>: "Coming Home" in two locations for the whole pastorate, depending on interest. Both courses will be during the day-time and held ideally in people's homes, with one in the Eastern end of the Pastorate at Creaton and the other in either Kilsby, Crick or Long Buckby, depending on who wants to take part. We need to have at least 4 people in the group to make it work. The courses will begin during the week starting March 6th and run for the five weeks of Lent. (Days and times to be arranged). Please either speak to me directly if you are interested or ask your Church Secretary to give me your name and a contact phone number. There is no book to be bought and if you cannot attend each session, you can still join in when you can. Jesus told us to love one another and care for the outcasts and marginalised; Paul told his churches to encourage one another. We are blessed to belong in this fellowship, let us remember to join hands facing outwards to the world and not inwards with our

So my grandfather used to sing. Of course it refers to 6d and 2d in "real" money that's when twelve 1d coins made 1/-.

In my childhood I can remember getting 1/- pocket money and having to buy a 6d Savings Stamp at the post office, before I could spend anything on sweets (the best were four for 1d- a proper pick and mix!).

I'm not sharing all of that to remind me of how old I am, but to introduce the topic of budgeting. Our Church Treasurers do brilliantly, balancing the church accounts and we all know they do a fantastic job getting a pint out of a quart jug.

BUT, just as it was good to ring-fence part of the 6d or 1/- up before spending anything, so too we can earmark our offertory and our Treasurers will find it helpful to know how much they will have to budget with. The story goes that the minister said to the congregation: "Friends I have good and bad news for you. The Good News is that we HAVE the money to complete our new church halls.... But the bad news is, that it's still in your-pockets!"

Do we give of our time, talents and treasure sacrificially?— literally an Offering so that we feel it? The Church has historically encouraged Tithing (giving a tenth of our resources)— what would that feel like? The alternative is giving a "Collection" — giving God the scraps which are left over after all the money is allocated.

On the Internet is a website devoted to Church Fundraising. It offers all manner of Fundraising ideas. The one proven to raise most money?? It was the Church "scratch card"!! The site was American but I don't think that's the issue. Surely these cards were promoting gambling? It might be argued that scratch-cards were on offer to people who would be buying then anyway and by offering Church as the beneficiary they made gamblers feel they were supporting some good works (like the Health Lottery). -We could have a long-ranging discussion about that whole area.

Envelopes

We used to say that it was only those who paid tax and were either employed or on a large pension who should to consider the envelope scheme, where you pledge to give a certain amount each month and the church can claim back Gift Aid so boosting our income...

A Message & News from the Minister continued

Even if you don't pay Income tax, to pledge to give a set amount each week/month and putting it into the dated envelope means that should you miss church one week, you still make your gift to God's work in our church and beyond.

Joining the envelope scheme allows the Treasurers to have a good idea of how much income there will be and reminds you to give regularly.

Envelopes are numbered and not named, so you have a discrete way of giving as you are able.

Each church has a person who oversees the envelope scheme, please have a chat with them to get the details.

For those of you who want to know how Gift Aid works to get extra money from your charitable giving, here is HMRC's (Inland Revenue is not a name currently used) explanation from their website. In theextract, "you" refers to the charity involved.

How does Gift Aid work?

When a UK taxpayer gives a gift of money to a charity, tax has already been paid on that money. Because you are exempt from tax, we can claim this money back from HM Revenue & Customs (HMRC) and give it to you. How is Gift Aid calculated?

Get ready for the maths – you may need a calculator for this one. Under HMRC's Gift Aid scheme, charities can reclaim an amount equal to basic rate tax (20%) on the amount of the donation, plus basic rate tax already paid by that taxpayer on that donation. To do this, you need to use a 'grossing up' fraction.

Let's take a £100 donation as an example.

The fraction applied to calculate Gift Aid is $100 \times 20/80$. This is 25% of £100 which equals £25.

We have fewer members than ever before and fewer ministers but the number of buildings and congregations has not reduced so the burden on each person is increased. Many people apparently are giving more each month, but there are fewer people around to give.

These are the facts. **Don't feel disheartened but do pick up the challenge**. If you don't already use the envelope scheme, please consider it. Chat with your friends and see what thoughts and suggestions you can come up with. The full figures are accessible for anyone who would like to look at them.

The Gospel imperative leads us to continue living the Good News and bringing hope and reconciliation to this fragmented world. The years ahead will bring us new challenges and may well force us to find different ways of being Gods heart, hands and feet in the world.

Remember you are loved.

Gerald Griffiths 1927-2017

Following a family committal at Three Counties Crematorium, we held a service of thanksgiving to celebrate Gerald's life on Thursday 2nd February.

Gerald's grandfather Tom had a haulage business and it was Gerald's father Tom, who looked after the stables, keeping the horses fit for purpose. Gerald was apprenticed to a shoe maker at the age of 14 but it was in the Navy where he found his real passion as an engineer. Gerald was brought up Anglican but Eileen, his wife of 40 years, was Roman Catholic. They pragmatically decided to take the boys, Trevor and Clive, to the Baptist Sunday School. Eileen and Gerald moved to a new house in Buckby Wharf in 1962, to assist with the care of a frail relative but it was so cold that the inside the frozen house the walls were icy, hardly a suitable place to take small boys, so they had to stay with family. Eventually the house was habitable and they moved in.

As a youngster Gerald enjoyed scouting and camping- an involvement that remained close to his heart for the whole of his life.
